

RECORD OF PROCEEDINGS

VILLAGE OF PLYMOUTH REGULAR SESSION

Held April 14, 2020

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The Village of Plymouth convened in regular session on April 14, 2020 at 7:00pm via teleconference and streamed live on facebook. Mayor Fryman called the meeting to order with the following members and visitors present:

Safety and Service reports

Safety

Chief Metzger stated not a whole lot going on since the last meeting. 86 of the 88 counties are now infected. Total cases in Ohio are 7,280. Hospitalizations are at 2,156. ICU admissions 654. Total deaths are at 324. Regarding social distancing, Governor Dewine was asked about sporting events and if they would be able to enjoy them, he stated he did not know. He did not know how long it would take to get out of what we are in right now with the restrictions that have been placed on us right now.

Chief Metzger stated we are just going to have to take it day by day. As far as our area, we were notified of a confirmed case in Plymouth Township on Monday, April 13. Still only showing 1 death in Richland County. He stated he did not have any numbers for Huron County. Everything is about the same as it was.

He asked if anyone had any questions.

Mrs. Moore asked if the death count is from strictly COVID-19 or are they including people who have died from other causes but had the virus, or tested positive for the virus as well.

Chief Metzger responded the deaths are for the ones directly related to the Corona virus. They were supposed to confirm today how they were calculating them but by the end of the meeting with the Governor they still did not have an answer for that. Most of them are complications related to the virus.

Service

Administrator Rusynyk gave a brief overview of his full report as seen below. His report is as follows:

Electric

The bucket truck and line truck each had their annual boom inspection this morning. While I am waiting on the full report from UTE, the technician did tell me that there were some minor issues (slight hydraulic leaks, worn hoses, etc.) that will need addressed. A new streetlight was installed on Curtiss Drive. Previously, there were no streetlights on the street, until a resident asked me if we could put one up.

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An East High St. resident reached out to me last week with concerns about a live electric wire dangling from her home. When I arrived at the house, I found the wire in question and informed the resident that the line was hers, not ours, and that an electrician needed to be called right away. Solar modules have begun arriving at the site and are being erected as they come in. Vaughan Electric says they have roughly two weeks of work remaining, then we will move to the testing phase of the project.

Water

One hundred water meters were ordered last week. Once they arrive (assuming things are back to normal), we will start installing them in peoples' homes. This should improve our current water loss situation. Connor and I have begun working on the 2019 CCR (consumer confidence report), which is due to the public no later than July 1st. At this rate, it will be done well before that date. Routine sampling has been carried out as usual. One of our sample sites has reached out to me requesting free water in return for sampling rights.

Wastewater

With recent heavy rains, our lift stations have been working overtime. Guys have had to come in after hours to reset pumps and monitor their operation. The quote for the lagoon pump that was taken to Buckeye Pump for repair arrived this morning. At \$4,700 in repair costs, I asked for a quote on a new pump. When I get that quote, I will make a decision. The post-air basin at the wwtp has been pumped out and scrubbed of all algae and other yucky stuff. This is in preparation for re-installing the UV disinfection system.

Street/Cemetery

Once again, West Broadway was cold patched from the square to the top of the hill. During a water leak this past winter, a resident's sidewalk was damaged by village equipment. That piece of sidewalk, along with another section in front of the Legion, has been dug out and formed up in preparation for concrete to be poured. Cemetery clean-up time has come and the guys have done a nice job removing all of the old décor, while making an effort to leave well-tended graves alone. We had one grave on Good Friday. Orders for spring footers have been placed, but CNS restorations has been deemed non-essential, so they may be poured later when all of this craziness has passed.

Mrs. Moore stated she wanted to publicly Thank Administrator Rusnyk for a great tour of the solar field and the wastewater treatment plant last week. If you have not been out there, she highly recommends to other Councilmembers to go visit. The wastewater plant is an amazing facility. It is very impressive. She appreciates the Administrator for taking the time and showing her around.




