Service

Mr. Patrick asked if there were any questions on the Administrator's report. Hearing none it will be included in the minutes. His report is as follows:

Electric

A concrete pad was poured around the recloser pole at our solar field. Two street lights were repaired/replaced. All lamp posts have been painted black. The post in front of the post office was knocked down, and we are working on getting a replacement head for it.

Wastewater

Two weekends ago, there was evidently some sort of short term power outage that affected our plant. When power was restored, the UPS (uninterrupted power supply) did not kick in the way in which it is supposed to. This in turn caused the PLC (Programmable Logic Controller) and the HMI (Human-Machine Interface) to not turn on. Without automatic instruction, the plant did not run. Our plant is heavily dependent on oxygen. Without being oxygenated, our plant will quickly turn septic. This is exactly what happened. When the dissolved oxygen supply runs out, all of the microbial life in our SBR's dies and turns black. We had to completely empty the tank, post-air basin, and UV channel and scrub each one in preparation for restart. There are quotes being worked on by vendors to replace old parts and hedge our bets against this type of thing happening in the future.

Water

Connor and I have been working with the OEPA to change our DBP sample siting plan because we have a resident, from whose home we use to sample, who would prefer we sample elsewhere. This is not a huge deal, but does take some time to get through. Meters were read and several remote heads were either repaired or replaced. This, along with meter replacement (which will commence when it is safe to enter homes of residents) will go a long way toward correcting our water loss issue.

Street/Pool/Park

The pool has been drained and the pit in the filter room has been resealed. This will eliminate the pit from the list of possible leak locations. When fully cured, we will again fill the pool and monitor leakage. A sidewalk was finished on West Broadway St. Hot patch asphalt was laid down in various spots around town where we had previously excavated. Mulch is being laid in and around the playground areas of our park. Curbs uptown have begun to be painted.

Safety – Mrs. Moore she had nothing at this time.

Chief Metzger the department should receive their radios in the next couple of weeks. The fire brush truck has been ordered. The annual chicken Bar-B-Q will be Saturday, August 8 starting at 11 am until they sell out. They will be cooking approximately 200 Chicken halves. This will be donation only. The Chicken dinner will consist of a chicken half, two sides, a roll and bottled water.





business may do so by choosing one of two options:




Attend any regular Tuesday Council meeting during the agenda reserved for public input.
